COLIN'S COLUMN

My gearbox is now back on the car with a relined clutch and so far seems to be ok although at the time of writing I have only covered 17 miles, hopefully with better weather promised I might do a few more miles before 'Drive it Day'. The problem I have been having was that oil was getting on the clutch and causing it to slip quite badly. The oil appeared to be coming from the front bearing so I took the gearbox to J.R.Transmissions and left it with them to fit a new bearing. They got back to me a week later to say there was nothing wrong with the bearing but whoever had fitted it (not me) had used Hylomar and it had blocked the drain holes that allow any oil getting past the bearing to drain back into the gearbox. They cleaned out the holes and fitted a new thrower, which Tony (Westhall) had kindly located for me, so hopefully I shall have no more problems with a slipping clutch. They seem to be a very good company to deal with so I have put them in the 'Parts and Services Directory' update for this month which you should receive with this newsletter.

March Club Night

The March club night was, for me and I think for most of the 33 members present, one of the most interesting evenings we have had. Michael Passmore, who was the Archivist for the AA until his retirement in 2000, gave a very good talk with the aid of slides, many taken at the beginning of the last century, on the history of the AA.

In 1905 a small group of motoring enthusiasts got together to consider ways to combat police persecution and to counter other anti-car activities. They formed what soon became known as the Automobile Association and appointed Stenson Cook as Secretary. A fleet of cycle scouts was set up to patrol main roads and warn members of any police traps ahead. Eventually one of them was arrested for obstructing the police in their duty, but Stenson Cook came up with a solution. The scouts who had previously saluted members as a matter of courtesy would no longer salute if there was a speed trap ahead; they therefore could not be prosecuted for doing nothing.

As more cars took to the road the era of the speed trap came to an end and the AA concentrated on providing other services to members. They equipped their scouts with motor bikes and sidecars to help members when they broke down, telephone boxes to call for help, erected the first petrol stations, the first one being at Aldermaston, erected signs to enable members to know where they were, produced maps and over the years offered many other services. They also had an Aviation Section, which was

formed in 1928 when private flying was becoming very popular, providing flying maps and maps of landing grounds in the UK.

After the talk Michael sold some of his books on the history of the AA, which he signed and also answered questions that some of the members had. If you were unable to come to the meeting but would like to know more about the history of the AA then I can recommend his book 'The AA' which is published by Shire Publications and costs just £4.50.

I am sure everyone would want me to thank Trevor for suggesting and arranging for Michael to give us this talk.

April Club Night

The April club night is when we hope that weather-permitting members while come in their proper cars, some of course have continued to come in theirs during the winter. As usual in April for those who do so there will be a free draw, with the winner receiving a £25 Marks & Spencer voucher. Lets hope the weather will be kind to us.

Fairly Short and Sweet

Having handed over the quill to our Editor-in-Chief, following her extended sojourn in the Antipodes, I don't have a great deal to talk about this time around but what there is *is* quite important:

Cricket St. Thomas:

Re the CST 'bash' in May (less than a couple of months away now!) I **must** ask for responses to four questions in order to finalize certain arrangements for the trip.

The plan will be for those going on the trip and who wish to do so to rendezvous fairly early at a spot on the outskirts of Basingstoke, (namely, Sainsbury's Car Park in the Hatch Warren Retail Park; details of precise location on the A30 to be provided later), before commencing the journey proper down to the West Country at approximately 9:00am.

I need to know, however, who **will** want to meet up there or, alternatively, may wish to make their own way down, in their own time, to a planned, mid-morning coffee stop in Stockbridge, on the A30. The intention is to have a half-hour coffee/tea and biscuits break there from around 10:30 – 11:00 am.

Tesco Petrol Experience!

Don't know if anyone else was affected by the recent contaminated petrol being dispensed from some Tesco Petrol Stations but Jean's *Corsa* fell victim to the stuff – twice! Well, once in actuality but it's taking two attempts to correct the situation.

Having filled up immediately prior to our trip to Madeira in February the car wasn't used for a while but, shortly after our return, the dreaded Exhaust Emission Light came on ominously and pointed to a fuel problem. This was confirmed, following a visit to the Vauxhall dealer. That was the bad news, the worse news was that there was a four-week lead-time for a replacement oxygen sensor! They cleaned up the existing sensor, replaced the spark plugs and cautiously expressed the opinion that the problem *might* be fixed though also stating that, should the light come on again, the only solution would be to replace the O2 sensor.

Needless to report, all was well for about ten days and then the inevitable happened! On came the light, again.

This time the lead-time is seemingly less, though still not immediate. Having been advised not to use the vehicle until the sensor *has* been replaced (potential damage to the catalytic convertor, if advice is ignored, etc!) Jean is temporarily 'without her horse', although Tesco have agreed to pay for a rental car for as long as it is necessary.

Tesco has come in for some stick over the issue but I have to report that the manner in which they are treating claims appears exemplary. They were extremely prompt in settling the initial claim for the non-effective 'fix' and have promised to treat a second claim similarly. One cannot expect more, though I think our local Petrol Station may be getting rather more business than previously until the 'coast is definitely clear' once again!

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Finally, food for thought.....

The subject of 'Retirement in Rotation', (for want of better terminology), for committee members, has occasionally been raised and is something upon which the views and opinions of members are being actively sought at this particular time.

Briefly the concept is that, each year, one NHAEG Committee Officer and one Committee Member would tender their resignation leaving two places open for new committee members to be elected. Friday, 22nd June. An informal get together at the Chequers Inn, Rookley, from 7.00 p.m. This is situated 4 miles south of Newport (going south, fork right off the A3020 at Rookley and, after just under a mile, you will find the Chequers on the left.). If required, you can get a meal here (suggest at 7.30 p.m.) or just come along, when convenient, for a 'Noggin and Natter' with us.

Saturday, 23rd June. Meet in the main Car Park at Godshill at 10.00 a.m., when entrants will be given a 'goody bag' in which you will find more details about the Weekend, including venues, route maps etc. Vehicles will depart from Godshill at 10.30 a.m. for a picturesque, non-competitive, run towards the West Wight. There will be an en-route coffee stop before we proceed to Fort Victoria, nr Yarmouth, for lunch. There are a number of attractions here including a Model Railway, Marine Aquarium, Underwater Archaeology Centre and the Island Planetarium. There are also on-site cafes, the Café Verdi and the Boathouse, and a picnic area. After lunch entrants will have free time to explore the Island.

In the evening it is hoped that all entrants will meet up at the Royal Victoria Yacht Club, Fishbourne, for a social evening with a 50s and 60s theme. Food will be provided and there will be live period music that you might like to strut to! This will start at 7.30 p.m. and finish at 11.00 p.m - the inclusive cost of the evening will be £12 per person.

Sunday, 24th June. Meet in the main Car Park at Godshill at 10.00 a.m., ready to leave for a run at 10.30 a.m. This will take us, via Newport, to Thetis Wharf in Cowes. At 11.15 a.m. we will embark on a boat, with a licensed bar, for a 1½ hour cruise of the River Medina and Cowes Harbour. The cost of the cruise will be £7 per person. Afterwards we will cross the River Medina to East Cowes, via the

Floating Bridge, and then make our way to Sandown Airport for lunch. This can be taken in the Aviator Restaurant or you can bring along your own picnic. During the course of the afternoon, awards will be presented to the owners of the car (a) that has travelled the furthest to attend the Weekend and (b) voted 'the most desirable'.
