As was mentioned in March's Newsletter the question of what options exist for the disbursement of any funds which *might* be left over, once our original goals have been met, will possibly arise in due course.

As was also stated the Committee, initially, had thoughts with regard to Headley Court, near Epsom which does such excellent work associated with the care and rehabilitation of severely wounded military personnel from today's trouble spots. However, on further investigation it became apparent that work done by a small but effective and efficiently run organisation called 'Help for Heroes' meets this and other equally important criteria. This, therefore, remains a distinct option towards which we may turn when (or perhaps, if) we find ourselves with excess funds to dispose of.

Rather than me 'rabbit on' about the organisation and its crucial work and for those having access to the Internet who may wish to learn more about 'H4H' as it's known – i.e. what it is, what it does, how it does it, etc - I strongly recommend they go to www.helpforheroes.org.uk. The site gives a wealth of information and answers just about every question one would want to ask. Although the organisation has not been in operation for very long it has already achieved a staggering amount of success in providing help for often very severely injured personnel, and their dependants/relatives, etc., both at Headley Court itself and Selly Oak Hospital. Birmingham which has a large military wing.

Peter (Barlow) has submitted details of a local event in which members also might be interested.


Cross Lanes Apple Farm, Mapledurham

QUERIES OF THE MONTH


Some more "Queries of the Month", these originally appeared in "The Austin Magazine & Advocate" during the 1930s and 1940s. This month's selection consists of two simple maintenance tasks. Instrument Lights – Austin Sixteen and Rear Axle Lubrication – Austin Ten.

No 490 appeared in April 1933 and No 826 appeared in September 1937.

No 490 – Instrument Lights – Austin Sixteen

Q. If the instrument panel lights fail on my 1933 Austin Sixteen how can I renew them? They appear to be incorporated inside the panel. Also how can the ignition warning light be replaced should this burn out?

A. If you feel behind the instrument panel you will find that the holder in which each panel light is mounted can be turned clockwise (as seen from the driving seat).




It is then withdrawable. The lamp is easily released from the holder and a new one fitted, the holder being finally replaced. The ignition warning light is similarly carried in a removal holder, but when the holder is dismounted the bulb screws out, instead of being held in a bayonet socket.

No 826 - Rear Axle Lubrication - Austin Ten

Q. I want to replenish the oil in the back axle of my Cambridge Ten, but before attempting this attention should like to have your suggestions as to the best procedure to adopt. Is it necessary to work from below the car?

A. As the filler and level plug for the rear axle is immediately under the leather cover below the rear seat, the axle lubricant can be quite readily replenished from inside the car. You will see that the leather cover is held by a metal rim secured by five screws to the floor of the body and in respect of the rear screws you will find it necessary to compress the rear squab cushion in order to engage the screwdriver squarely with them.



You should note that it is important to maintain the correct level of oil in the rear axle, and the filler plug on the near-side of the axle casing also serves to determine the level. Thus, after replenishing, if any oil flows out of this orifice, it will be the excess not required in the axle, and should be allowed to drain clear before the plug is replaced. You will have to use the special adapter on the gun, and the new oil should be the same brand as that already in the axle.

Another old advertisement, this time from April 1957, as usual I have tried to trace the company, "Teale's of Ipswich" but there does not seem to be any trace of them anymore. Mind you they did offer a refund if you were not happy with the product so perhaps they were also difficult to find in 1957! Sounds like a good product, I wonder how big the bucket should be!

Billy Ness' story - Part 2.

His continuing personal account of events around D-Day and beyond.

Part 1 appeared in the March Newsletter.

....."They rushed us back. At Calais there was a long line of trucks waiting.

That winter was terrible, so as we were jumping into the trucks we were counting down. One of the lads pointed out a truck with no tarpaulin on. 'Have you seen that, Geordie?'

"I said, 'Aye', and, sure enough, it turned out to be ours. The lads were standing on the back stamping their feet, we were frozen but we bashed on down till we got to Namur before digging in.

By the time we reached the Ardennes the old second-in-command of the Battalion had taken over.

He later became General Sir Kenneth T (Thomas) Darling, CBE, and KCB, ADC (Commander in Chief Allied Forces Northern Europe, but he was Katie (KT) Darling to us and he was a smasher, he knew his stuff". He used to often say he was like a money lender, 'no advance without security'. We moved further forward, it was just like putting a cork in the bottle, is how they described it. Although Jerry had shot his bolt one of our Battalions, the 13th Battalion, came across one of their very best tanks units which was still trying to get through, and I think the 13th Battalion lost 50 or 60 blokes in the village of Bure.

When that was sorted out they moved us away from there, but instead of sending us back home they took us to the River Maas. The river was fairly dangerous and we were getting a bit of shelling and sniping and we were sending fighting patrols across.

All of a sudden things changed again and the Americans took over from us and we knew we were going to come home. But, you know, a man on a galloping horse could see what was happening. We came home, got seven days leave, then went back again and then it was parachuting over the Rhine.

The Rhine was totally different to Normandy, it was daylight, you saw where you were going, you were jumping out of a Dakota and you could see where everything was.

But for the gliders it was a bit of a shambles, a lot of the gliders took fire as they were hit from the ground as they were coming in.

I saw one Dakota crash, one man got out, the rest went down and there was this big ball of flames.

Our second in command was shouting `Get off the bloody DZ, get off' but I don't think we got a counter-attack because the Second army was already over the Rhine when we dropped just in front of them. We got through and we stayed there about 36 hours, and all of a sudden they brought up the Guards Armoured Brigade and after that we were either on top of tanks or in trucks following on."

BILLY'S battalion attacked a village called Erle which, after the war became a textbook standard on how to attack a fixed position.

"We started off, we were going to the village of Erle, but we didn't go into it, we went round to the rear. Major Stephens had the compass, the second in command was counting paces, and we were moving behind.

So we were going and he was saying, 'Left, left', I was Section Commander because our Lieutenant had been killed and Sergeant Kitchener had moved up, so I was in the front, V-shaped, we were moving forward.

We got to the village and a postman coming up the road saw us. We wore our red berets, otherwise our own lads used to take a pot at us. And I still remember he got off his bike, he had a look at us and all of a sudden he shouted, I think there must have been 40 blokes fired at him, and I don't think one of the buggers hit him.

We got fired on. I got down and I looked and asked if anyone could see anything. Every instinct in my body told me to stay where I was hiding behind two bales of grass, then all of a sudden I shouted, 'Howay lads, let's go'. We rushed up, went forward and then we went through the village like a dose of salts.

Afterwards we were all sitting around waiting for the tanks to come, when this cyclist rode up and he stopped his bike, he looked at us, and all of a sudden one of the lads said 'Hey, that's a Jerry'. He was captured of course, but we'd just let him walk in.

After that we bashed on. There was Sergeant Kitchener and the second-in command behind a tank, they were belting on to see what was in front, the battalion was resting.

We found this big square and something knocked the tank out, Lieutenant Reid was killed, his orderly was badly wounded. We all staggered into the side and then we discovered we were in the middle of a German barracks.

We stayed away. K T (Katie) Darling brought his tanks up and battered the area and when we got up it was all clear and we bashed on that night.

I think it was just before Osnabruck, we were going into this village and we beat it up then we got back on the tank and came away.

I felt something, anyway adrenaline must have been going, then all of a sudden somebody said 'Look at your leg'. When I stood the blood was pouring out. "All you can see now is a wee little hole, but it smashed a little bone, that's jellified, and it's still in by the way, the big one, it's a bullet or a ball-bearing because they were even firing blunderbuses and all sorts, it was a standing joke when we got back, we were fighting the German Home Guard and they beat us."

It took about three days before Bill got back to the main body and then he was hospitalised at Bruges. Doctors told him, 'We're going to leave it in and take it out as soon as the war was over.

"I thought well that's queer why don't they do it now, the war's over. We were sent to a convalescing camp, we were sitting and one day a great big lorry came up and someone shouted all airborne troops were going back home.

When we got home I thought hey this is great. Then I remember being told to go to the gym, I went across, it was full of jungle greens.

"I can honestly say that was one time my heart sank. They said, 'Right you're getting leave', I think we got 14 days, came back, and it was out to India.

While we were in Bombay they dropped the atom bomb, so they hurried it up and we went on a thing called Operation Zipper. We landed in Malaya when the war had finished but the peace hadn't been signed. Honestly Normandy was bad, but that was the biggest cock-up I've ever seen. By this time I was a Sergeant.

I remember looking from the ship and the beach being a long way off. Some lads were just walking along and after about 30 yards, down they went.

The officers were shouting something's wrong here. It turned out we were on a sand bar.

Eventually we made the beach, but we were in utter chaos.

We stayed there for a day before they sent us to Singapore. When we went down there I saw some of the ladies who had been kept prisoner, they were like skeletons.

Then strangely enough they sent me to India, to a Small Arms School, which I passed by the way, because they thought I was going to stay in the Army - but I didn't.

But while I was away the Brigade was sent to Indonesia. While they were in Indonesia, they hadn't enough men so the Brigadier had a Battalion of Japanese under his command.

I came back to the Battalion who had come back from Indonesia, and we were in Changi Jail. Some of us were in the condemned block.

I met two of my cousins out there from the Second Battalion DLI. Then they told us we were going to Palestine.

It was there I got my eye split open, there was a crowd we were trying to keep them calm and a little Jewish chap hit me with a brick. I saw it coming and I chased after him.

Somebody said it was comical, he's running, the crowd opens up to let him through, the blood was pouring down my face, and when I came back the company commander said, 'You were lucky there, mind Nessy', he said, 'You could have gotten a knife in you in that crowd.'

Sometime after this episode in Palestine many of the Battalion returned home and were demobbed of no further need of their services following a return to a sort of normality of peacetime.
