Tooling and <u>F</u>quipment

It may be a bit of a surprise to some but there is a stock of tooling available for members to borrow if they find themselves needing that special bit of equipment to effectively carry out a particular job on their historic beast.

I recently wanted to change a slightly worn kingpin on my A10 'Colwyn' and found myself needing the right piece of kit to (a) withdraw the old kingpin and (b) the two bushes, as well as replacing both with the new ones. Several methods are put forward in the ATDC Technical Reprints Volume One publication but the one which seemed the most likely to be effective involved the use of a die, (in this case a 20mm version) which, when welded to a length of threaded rod, can be used like a stud extractor for the bottom bush which is in a blind hole. Thanks to Andy (Seager) and his excellent workshop skills a suitable tool was fabricated which worked perfectly. This, together with another similar tool for A12's and some other bits and pieces, is now boxed up and available for any member to borrow should the need arise. QUERIES OF THE MONTH


Some more "Queries of the Month", these originally appeared in "The Austin Magazine & Advocate" during the 1930s and 1940s.

This month's selection consists of No 456 Universal Joints, Austin Sixteen and No 1218 Wheel Removal, Austin Seven

No 456 appeared in December 1932 and No 1218 appeared in April 1945.

No 456 – Universal Joints – Austin Sixteen

Q. With regard to your recommendations concerning universal joints of the Hardy-Spicer type, I notice that lubrication is only required every six months. I am wondering whether there is any risk of causing trouble by over-lubricating.




I have previously owned an Austin Seven and have found that on this model too much grease tends to displace the joint cover.

A. You need not concern yourself about the adverse effects arising from over-greasing the Hardy-Spicer universals. Apart from the fact that the covers are of metal, and will resist any tendency for the grease to escape, provision is made in the design for a special outlet for excess of lubricant. If you follow the handbook instructions to lubricate once every six months with Mobil "C" or Jaba Oil "C" you cannot go wrong.

No 1218 – Wheel Removal – Austin Seven

Q. I have recently endeavoured to remove the wheels of my Seven, with a view of changing them round to equalize tyre wear. But one of them refuses to come away from the brake-drum. I have tried prising from the rear, but without success. Can you suggest a method of removal?

A. It seems that rust has developed between the hub shell of the wheel and the hub or brake-drum. Prising or tapping from the rear should be undertaken with care or otherwise the brake shield may be damaged or distorted. We suggest you apply paraffin round the wheel studs and the locating bosses or dowels on the drum which fit the hole in the hub shell adjacent to the studs. Also apply paraffin carefully round the back of the hub shell to penetrate between it and the outside of the brake-drum. By doing this and allowing the paraffin time to soak in between the surfaces in contact – several hours at least, or even a day or so – you should find that the rusting will have been counteracted, and the wheel will come clear without undue persuasion being necessary.




The moral of all this, of course, that when fitting the wheel, it should be wiped round inside the hub shell with an oily or greasy rag, and the same treatment should be given to the external surfaces of the brakedrum, to discourage rusting while the two units are held together by the wheel nuts.
