21st July. Mid-week NHAEG run to Winchester

Hampshire born and bred, Alan Pickett designed this route to provide a pleasant drive to the measured centre of Hampshire. Along with fellow Fleet resident John Pratt, they had done a recce about a fortnight before and, after getting lost a couple of times in villages (where the lack of signage and different road priorities confused them), they pronounced it a good potential round trip of 64 miles – long enough to require a good leg stretch at the destination!

Starting from The New Inn in Heckfield, their two Austin Sevens provided an interesting comparison between the performance of the 3 and 4 speed gearbox models, as they encountered a few long straights and quite a lot of (probably quite modest) hills. Don't get the idea that any great speed was involved, as the byways of Hampshire were narrow, twisty and quite rough. But at least they were quiet and John said he thought he could have been transported back to the main roads of the 1930s – 35mph seemed pretty fast in the circumstances!

On such a beautiful sunny day, nothing could have been more pleasurable than pottering along down long valleys and through sun-dappled woods, with the sunroof open. Having navigated Old Basing and found Polecat Corner, the straight run down the B3046 through Cliddesden, Axford and the Candovers passed some great looking pubs (making a mental note to return another day!). After leaving the B-road at Totford, they headed to Martyr Worthy and then to Easton, eventually reaching the Winchester Science Centre & Planetarium at around 12.15pm.

A part of local social history that can be sampled 'as it used to be'.!!





QUERIES OF THE MONTH

Another one from "Queries of the Month". These originally appeared in "The Austin Magazine & Advocate" during the 1930s and 1940s. This month's selection is No 1219, Misfiring – Austin Ten and appeared in June 1945.

No 1219 - Misfiring. Austin Ten

- **Q.** I am a little puzzled about a tendency on the part of the engine of my Austin Ten (1939 model) saloon to misfire, particularly at high speeds. This tendency first became apparent some months ago and has since become more pronounced. I have fitted a new set of plugs hoping that this would cure the trouble as my old ones had been in service for over 18,000 miles, but this change does not appear to have the desired effect. The ignition leads seem quite sound and I have carefully checked the contact breaker points. I should be very grateful for you advice on this matter.
- **A.** Providing that the high-tension ignition cables and the contact breaker points on your car are quite in order, and the plugs are new, there is another possible cause of the misfiring, namely, tracking inside the distributor cover. Remove the cover and carefully examine it to see if there is any tendency for a faint grey line to run between any two of the electrodes. If such marks are fairly obvious, you can assume that current is short circuiting in the distributor head and not reaching the plugs as it should. In this event the only certain cure is to obtain a new distributor cover.



If the distributor appears to be in good condition, you should consider the possibility of sticking valves causing the misfiring on your car, the question of petrol starvation at the higher speeds should also be borne in mind, as a restriction in the fuel system or faulty operation of the pump might produce symptoms similar to those of ignition trouble, when the maximum flow of petrol is required.

An old advertisement from 1934 for an exhaust-operated siren, no manufacture or supplier was quoted in the magazine; readers were required to write in to the editor for details. Not the way to do business these days. Not sure how loud it really was being fitted to the rear of the vehicle but it saved on battery power. The purchase cost in 1934 seems quite high for the average motorist; also the fitting is to a large diameter exhaust pipe. Probably only for the luxury limousine market.

An Exhaust-operated Siren ONSIDERABLE demand is made on the resources of the car battery in these days, and it is quite a good plan to have a warning signal that is not electrically operated, such as the one illustrated, which is operated from the exhaust. Having a chord of six notes it makes a pleasant warning signal, similar to a ship's siren, and is audible at a great distance. It is not a difficult job for any mechanically-minded motorist to instal, and is supplied, complete with the necessary coned unions, supporting brackets, and Bowden control. The price is £3 10s. for sizes up to and including 2in., and above that size, £4 10s. 6 NOTE CORD TUBES An ingenious exhaust siren.
