Nightjar 2010

Our prayers were answered this year so far as the weather was concerned. Although it was a bit nippy, at least it remained mercifully dry – a distinct change from last year's appalling conditions. Eventually, from an initial entry list of 19 'real' cars and 10 moderns, the starting grid had 18 pre-war and 12 moderns, this due to one having to withdraw due to human (not mechanical!) frailty and two changes of Class – from 'Ancient to Modern'.

From reports received verbally immediately after the event and from a number of emails received later, it is very clear that this year's 'Nightjar' was rated one of the best, if not <u>the</u> best ever! It seemed to be pitched at just about the right level of difficulty/frustration – one contestant stating that he didn't hear anywhere near the amount of thrashing about in the undergrowth and swearing that is usual during the evening! The trouble with producing such an enjoyable and evidently well-received event is following it up the next year. This will be the challenge!

We also managed to raise just over £114.00 in aid of 'Help for Heroes', our adopted charity for this year, thanks largely to the efforts of Ruth (Ewart) with her 'Name the Charity Bear' (subsequently called 'Monty') and from loose change dropped into H4H collecting tins dotted around the tables. This was a really excellent result and thanks must go to Ruth and Pauline (Barlow) who, between them, stood the cost of and donated 'Monty' to the cause.

A sum slightly in excess of £400.00 has been raised throughout the year, via various initiatives, in support of H4H and it has been decided to top this up to a level £500.00 from Club funds to complete our efforts for the year. A cheque for this amount will therefore be sent off shortly to that particular charity.

In addition, as per our now standard practice, all Club members are invited to nominate a charity of their choice which, it is felt, would benefit from a fairly modest donation derived from a percentage of *'Nightjar'* excess income. Historically, this has been in the order of 25% and, although Jean, our Treasurer, has yet to finalise the precise numbers, this is likely to be something in the order of £115/£120. The only criterion is that the chosen charity **must** be a relatively small, *local* one. It may be a hospice, day centre, animal charity or, in fact, anything else which is held in esteem by the member concerned but please, please, <u>do not</u> nominate one of the big, rather impersonal and, in many cases, already well-funded, national ones, having high administration costs. Any donation made is intended to make just a small but tangible difference to the recipient charity.

A *Nomination Slip* for this is also included with this Newsletter. Please give it some thought, fill it in and let me have this back by 6th January 2011.

A draw will be made at the AGM to decide which charity should benefit.

QUERIES OF THE MONTH


Some more "Queries of the Month", these originally appeared in "The Austin Magazine & Advocate" during the 1930s and 1940s. This month's selection consists of No 739, Tyre Fitting – Austin Sixteen and No 1091, Battery Care.

No 739 appeared in June 1936, and No 1091 appeared in July 1942.

No 739 – Tyre Fitting – Austin Sixteen.

Q. I read with interest the article in a recent issue of "The Austin Magazine" on tyre maintenance, with hints on changing covers. Further to the advice concerning the correct location of the guide ring on each tyre wall I should like to inquire whether there is a correct circumferential position for the tyre on the rim. I have not seen this point mentioned and should like your advice on it, as hitherto, when changing or fitting covers, I have assumed that there is no special circumferential position on the cover.

A. There are two indications on the cover of the tyre which serve as a guide for the correct fitting. The ring you mention, which should be concentric with the rim edge, forms a guide to the lateral location of the tyre in the rim. There is also a red mark on the walls of the tyres fitted to your car. This is for the purpose of determining the correct circumferential position for the cover by indicating the part of the cover which should be adjacent to the valve. Actually, the purpose of this marking is to ensure that the heaviest portion of the periphery of the tyre is situated diametrically opposite to the valve so that it tends to balance the valve instead of creating additional unbalance as it would in any other position. Attention to these two points in fitting the tyres will ensure more even wear and smoother running.




No 1091 – Battery Care

Q. People who will shortly have to lay up their cars for an indefinite period would like authoritive advice about the best way of treating the batteries. Some garages say take the batteries out and have them charged monthly; others say that even nearly new batteries will be of little use after six months of this treatment, so it

is practically useless; others again recommend drainage of the acid and thorough washing out with distilled water and claim that the plates will then last unharmed and will do their job when the batteries can be refilled with acid and put to work again. Will you be so kind as to tell us what we ought to do?

A. We dealt with this in our May issue of the Magazine, but can quote from the article concerned the following information, namely, that you will have to remove the battery and put it in the hands of your local garage for the charge to be maintained and general conditioned to be watched.




Usually the battery should then last a very long period if in reasonably good condition to start with. Alternatively, you could charge the battery and drain it of electrolyte (i.e. acid) and wash it out with distilled water, this policy being adopted to avoid sulphation of the plates. The battery should then remain in good condition for some time. It should not be connected to the electrical circuit of the car.

Some more old adverts from motoring magazines of the 1950s.


We take reliability of our modern cars for granted today with most engine components easily last up-to a 100,000 miles. The advert for Tranco S.A.S Valves in 1957 appears to be a milestone achievement. Although it was stated that no special maintenance was undertaken on the Austin A40 and the valves lasted 50,000 miles, I should think it was a very controlled 50,000 miles with routine de-cokes being part of the normal vehicle maintenance schedule!



This magnetic dipstick seems like a good idea, it would also be useful for picking up nuts, bolts, washers etc that have been dropped into hard to get at places when working on the car.



How about a small car from the 1950s



I managed to find the following information on the Internet; it appears to be even slower than an A7!

Scootacar was a British three wheeled microcar built in Leeds by Scootacars Ltd a division of the railway locomotive builder, the Hunslet Engine Company between 1957 and 1964.

It was allegedly built because the wife of one of the directors wanted something easier to park than her Jaguar. The shape of the car was designed by Henry Brown who did it by sitting on a Villiers engine and then having an assistant draw an outline around him. The body was built in glass fibre and was very tall for its size being 60 in (1524 mm) high, 87 in (2210 mm) long and only 52 in (1321 mm) wide. It was nicknamed "the telephone booth". Two people could be carried with a passenger behind the driver or alternatively just squeezed in alongside. Power came from a Villiers 9E 197 cc single cylinder 2 stroke engine coupled to a four speed motorcycle type gearbox and chain drive to the single rear wheel. Steering was by handlebars. The top speed was 50 miles per hour (80 km/h).

In 1960 came the De Luxe or Mark 2, with a totally redesigned body with more room and seating for three, but it appeared too late to sell in any great numbers. It had a top speed of 55 mph (89 km/h) and sold for $\pounds 275$.

In 1961 the De Luxe Twin Mark 3 cars appeared fitted with a 250 cc twin giving a top speed of 68 mph (109 km/h).

Production stopped in 1964 after a total of about 1000 Scootacars were made, but only about 20-30 had the larger engine.
