Carrots, cabbages and one old banger

T THE beginning of World War II, one of my father's customers asked him if he would store an Austin 7 car for him for the duration. Father said the rent would outdo the value of the car if the war lasted very long. So the gentleman decided to sell it to my father for the vast sum of ten shillings - about £10 today. Taxed and insured, it was ready to cart our bags of Brussels sprouts, cabbages, cauliflowers and other items. We put a pair of track tyres on the back axle, and it was so light it would go anywhere. We never got stuck. The hood was in the way, so we lowered it and, before long, it had fallen off completely. The windscreen wiper was worked

by hand, but some time later the lower part of the windscreen was knocked out, and we would proceed with a healthy blast coming through the bottom half. This Austin 7 ran summer and winter alike until late 1944 before it gave up the ghost. So we had tremendous value for our ten shillings. Next, we bought an Austin 7 saloon and cut off the back to turn it into a pick-up truck. That lasted for about three years. After that we had an ex-RAF Standard 12. The first Austin 7 we called 'the Jeep', the second one we called 'the Bug', but as the Standard 12 was always breaking down, we called all the names under the sun! Alec Worbey, Hitchin, Herts.



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The Austin Seven Book

I was recently given some books by a friend, included in them was one called "The Austin Seven Book" by R.T. Nicholson. This was the nearest to a manual on the Austin Seven that was available when the cars were new. The book I have, which is not in the best of condition, is the third edition which does not give any date but I would think, having read it, was published about 1931 certainly no later than 1932.

The fourth chapter deals with the cost of running an Austin Seven which I found quite amusing especially with regards to prices. Below is a copy of this chapter with words and punctuation exactly as they appear in the book, I think now days we would find some of it rather condescending, especially the last paragraph, but I suppose anyone buying this book in 1931 had probably never had a car before and therefore knew very little about running them.

I also find amazing the miles per gallon that supposedly could be obtained from a new Austin Seven, can any of you Seven owners get 60 miles to the gallon? I am sure I never did on either of the Sevens I owned, I am not sure I even got 47 that the author gives as a modest estimate.

Cost Of Running an Austin Seven

It seems as if it ought to be easy to calculate the cost of running: but it isn't. Much depends on the number of miles you run annually: the greater the mileage, the less the cost per mile: on the other hand, the smaller your mileage, the less, obviously, will your outgoings be.

As regards three items of your running expenses—cost of petrol, lubricants and tyres—they can be calculated with some approach to exactness.

Petrol—47 miles to the gallon is a modest estimate of the capabilities of the Austin Seven. While you may not get such results for the first 500 miles, you may thereafter do even better. Some Austin Seven owners assure me that they can get up to 60. Let us, however, base our calculations on 47. The cost of petrol fluctuates, but let us assume that it costs 1s. 5d. a gallon. Cost per mile for petrol is then a little over one third of a penny per mile.

Lubricants—Cost is so small as to be almost negligible. A gallon of oil will serve for all purposes-engine , gearbox and general lubrication--for at least 1800 miles. Cost of grease for over 10,000 miles will be only a shilling or two. You can call this about £2.10s for 10,000 miles say, one—twentieth of a penny a mile.

Tyres—Your five tyres should carry you from 10,000 to 12,000 miles, Say 10,000—or three tenths of a penny a mile.

Other items are not so obvious.

Insurance—You must insure. Risks—especially "third party" risks—are otherwise too great. You may drive as carefully as you please, but you can't count on what the "other fellow" will do; and you may be landed in heavy liability—amounting even to hundreds of pounds.

The premium varies according to the size of the population of the city or town in which the owner lives. I have assumed a premium of ± 10 in the table following, but it will be less in some cases, more in others.

Repairs necessitated by accidents will be covered by insurance. Careful attention and good driving should otherwise make their cost negligible for the first 10,000 miles. After that a general overhaul may cost from $\pounds 5$ to $\pounds 10$.

Interest on cost of the car may be figured at £6 5s. a year.

Tax and Licence cost £8 5s.

Garage—If you have to build a garage, you will have to add interest on your outlay and allow for depreciation; or you may have to pay for garaging elsewhere.

Water for washing may cost you something.

Depreciation is inevitable—even with careful tending and driving. Mere age tells and the car will gradually shed value. Second-hand Austin Sevens, however, fetch good prices and on the basis of such prices, we shall be safe in calculating depreciation at 20 per cent. per annum—less perhaps after the first year.

Let us now assume a mileage of 10,000 a year—by no means a heavy one—and see what running will cost during the first year. In that year tyres and repairs should cost nothing; I have therefore omitted those items, as also garage and water, because they are indefinite.

This indicates that the cost of the first years running of the 10,000 miles will be very well under $1\frac{3}{4}$ d. a mile.

Now let us look at the cost of running for the second year. The first five items in the above list will work out at the same figure; depreciation (on the basis of 20 per cent, of the reduced value) will be ± 20 as against ± 25 . This will mean ± 62 . On the other hand, we shall need a new set of tyres—say, ± 8 —and possibly repairs to the value of ± 7 10s. This will bring our outgoings up to ± 77 10s—under 2d. a mile.

While there is necessarily some approximation in my calculations, they will serve as a basis for yours. You may be able to run more cheaply; on the other hand, carelessness may land you in higher figures. My calculations will also serve as a basis for greater or smaller mileage—which will considerably affect the cost per mile.

The reason why mileage does thus affect the cost per mile lies of course, in the fact that there are certain" overheads" expenses which you incur whether you run the car or not; e.g. taxation, licence, insurance, interest, depreciation. On the other hand, petrol, tyres, lubricants, cost you more the more miles you run.

QUERIES OF THE MONTH

Some more "Queries of the Month", these originally appeared in "The Austin Magazine & Advocate" during the 1930s and 1940s. This month's selection consists of No 475 Freezing and No 538 Instrument Panel – Austin Ten-Four.

No 475 appeared in March 1933 and No 538 in November 1933.

No475 - Freezing

Q. I have seen from time to time in the Magazine various useful instructions as to the precautions against freezing, but have not seen any mention of what should be done if, through oversight or neglect, the cooling water does freeze. How am I to know if it has frozen? Your advice on this point is awaited with interest.

A. The first symptom of a freeze-up is, strange to say, steam issuing from the radiator cap after the engine has run a short time. This is simply due to the water above the cylinder-head not being able to circulate, thus being quickly converted to steam.



To thaw the ice in the cooling system takes time. Warm water (not hot) can be added so far as possible through the radiator filler or poured down the radiator front, and once the circulation of the water has been restored, the remaining ice will quickly melt as the engine warms up. The coldest point will be the lower hose connection, through which the cooled water re-enters the engine from the radiator. Freezing often occurs first at this point and it is sometimes possible to dislodge the ice in the connection by squeezing it, to restore the circulation. In the event of a really bad freeze-up, it is important to examine the engine and radiator for any damage that the ice may have caused, which may not be evident until the system has been thawed. Damage, as with water pipes in the house, occurs in freezing, but is sometimes only evident (alas!) when the thaw takes place. Apart from the numerous anti-freezing precautions we have suggested, it is important to keep cold draughts way from the radiator when the car is garaged. A cold draught through a badly fitting garage door will easily cause freezing whilst the general temperature of the garage is relatively safe.

No 538 - Instrument Panel - Austin Ten-Four

Q. My new Ten-Four, I find differs from previous car in having an illuminated instrument panel. Recently, I noticed in "The Austin Magazine" particulars as to how to reach the panel lights on the Sixteen in the event of these failing. May I take it that the same instruments apply in respect of the panel of my new car? I should like your advice on this point so that I can readily renew the bulb in case of a failure, or use the panel light as a spare for the rear or side-lamp, if it is of the correct size for these.

A. The construction of the illuminated instrument panel on the latest Ten-Four model differs from that on the Austin Sixteen, dealt with in our issue for last April, the lamps which illuminate the instruments having a different form of mounting.



Actually, they are much easier of access, and can be readily located beside the speedometer and clock. Each lamp socket is mounted on a pivoting arm which swings back away from the panel, so the bulb can be removed without difficulty in the normal manner for a bayonet type mounting. As you assume, the bulb is suitable for the side lamps or the rear lamp, and its designation is B.A.S.10S.

We will only give advice or input when asked to do so and will continue simply to enjoy all the Club has to offer – but from the other side of the fence, so to speak. Having made that point, the 'Nightjar', for example, will continue, for the foreseeable future, to be organised by those who have done so for many years (until and unless others may be prepared to do so) and the annual Club trips/excursions/'experiences' will remain a feature of the annual calendar but again, *only* until such time as other alternatives may become available.
