QUERIES OF THE MONTH


Some more "Queries of the Month", these originally appeared in "The Austin Magazine & Advocate" during the 1930s and 1940s. This month's selection consists of Direction Indicators – Austin Fourteen and Stoplight – Austin Ten.

No 1136 appeared in July 1943, and No 1221 appeared in June 1945.

No 1136 – Direction Indicators – Austin Fourteen

Q. The direction indicators on my Fourteen are working somewhat sluggishly – in fact, on one or two occasions, the left one has been too lazy to lift fully. Can you suggest a cause and remedy?


A. The sluggish operation of your direction indicators may result from several causes. Are you sure that your battery is fully charged? "Lazy" direction indicators are one of the first signs of a low state of charge. Then it may be a matter of adjustment, the arm tending to foul the slot in the body, possibly through having been displaced slightly. Although not a likely cause, there is also the possibility of the indicator assembly not earthing efficiently, due to rust or corrosion of its mounting bolts.



These are accessible on removing the trimming covering the inside of the door pillar, and if they are corroded, they can with advantage be cleaned up, also the metal of the pillar with which they make contact. The most likely cause, however, of the trouble you are experiencing is stiffness in, calling for lubrication of, the operating linkage. This can be best achieved by switching the indicator on, supporting it whilst it is switched off and then applying to the linkage a very thin oil very sparingly, by means of a brush or feather.

No 1221 – Stoplight - Austin Ten

Q. I have been told that the stoplight of my 1939 Ten is constantly flickering on and off during quite normal periods of driving. Could you tell me how to rectify this?




A. The stoplight is controlled by a small switchbox mounted in the frame, which is actuated by a spring attached to the rear brake rod at a point approximately in line with the steering wheel. We suggest that on your car this spring is over tensioned so that the vibration of the brake rod during normal road travel is sufficient to bring the switch into operation. To rectify matters you should move the clip attaching the spring to the brake rod a little nearer to the switchbox. An eighth-of-an-inch should be quite sufficient to ensure that the stoplight operates only when there is a positive forward movement of the brake rod.

I don't think you will see many mechanics these days wearing a tie, especially a plastic one! I wonder how many were sold. The company, H. J. Boulting Ltd, still exists today in Leicester, now trading as H. J. Boulting and Sons Ltd. They have moved away from plastic ties and now specialise in industrial recycling. They also produce spill control and general wipe products.



I have seen caps on brake bleed nipples but not on grease nipples, not a bad idea, should be worth investigating the availability of them today.



I can remember our insurance man in the 1950s having one of these on his bicycle, I don't know how fast it went but I wonder how well the standard bicycle rubber brake blocks worked! One of these might come in useful these days on the back wheel of an Austin Seven!

W.T. Teagle (Machinery) Ltd was a family firm producing hedge trimmers and lawn mowers using the same 50cc cyclemotor engine in the 1950s. The company exists today as Teagle Machinery Ltd and is still in Blackwater, Cornwall. The company has grown into a major engineering concern producing a variety of agricultural machinery and equipment.
