

Normandy 2009.

Once again the weather was mostly very kind, apart from the very instant when our beleaguered Prime Minister appeared on the scene at Arromanches and the Heavens opened – how ominously significant was that!

Also, once again, it was a delight and privilege to meet with so many D-Day veterans proudly wearing their medals and all determined to 'stay the course', despite the 'rain on their parade'. Some were so weighed down with the number of medals sported they were almost leaning over to one side! One of the following photos, especially, conveys this image quite well.

Without dwelling too long on the subject it goes without saying that all our recent efforts to raise funds for the cause we adopted earlier this year proved very well worth it. Actually meeting up with one of those benefitting (ex- para Billy Ness) brought home to all of us who went on the trip how real and genuine the appreciation is for our actions. Our journey out to Normandy and, indeed, travelling around the region went virtually without any untoward problem so far as our ancient machinery was concerned. The vehicles inevitably caused a great deal of interest and prompted a significant amount of energetic hand-waving and (I think!) mainly friendly gestures from the residents of Normandy. In fact, towards the end of our stay, Jean made the suggestion that, *if* we were to do the trip again, some form of automatic hand-waving device might be a useful piece of equipment to take!

Unfortunately, for 'PO', Jean and I, we were to end the last 20-odd miles or so of the return journey this side of the Channel rather ignominiously with 'PO' strapped firmly on the back of a recovery vehicle (see photo). In fact the cause of breakdown turned out to be fairly straightforward and ultimately quick to fix (the gear-lever suddenly became useless) but, at the time, I was more inclined to investigate thoroughly the cause of the problem at home rather than on the road-side dodging impatient rush-hour traffic!

I can whole-heartedly confirm, however, as a result of this episode, that the recovery service provided with insurance offered by RH Specialist Insurers, Brentwood, (many of us are with that company, I know) is absolutely first-class. The recovery vehicle was with us within 45 minutes and we were home roughly 45 minutes later, though the ride proved to be a 'white-knuckle' one!

2010 Trip

After all our hard work raising money for the veterans, at last the day of 2^{nd} June dawned and what a beautiful day – warm and sunny. In fact Dave and I were very lucky as we took the whole week off work and the day before we had had a lazy day on the beach – it certainly beats working for a living!

Dave and I were really looking forward to the trip. Not only is it great when plans come together , we also had a number of little treats lined up for the ' chamois leather' group BUT most importantly we were all set up for a meeting with Billy Ness – my granddad and Pauline Barlow's dad!!

Billy had travelled out to France on the Sunday, having spent all of Saturday in a minibus coming down from his home town of Newcastle. I had the details of where he and his group were staying – a little way from the lovely town of Bayeux. We had arranged to meet up on the 5th June when we would be at Pegasus Bridge. You may recall that Billy was parachuted into that area on the 6th June.

The day before – the 4^{th} June was quite an extraordinary day for us. We decided to visit the Batterie at Longues sur Mer. This is impressive as it is quite intact and you can get a real sense of just how scary these gun emplacements were – imagine going

through all the trauma of arriving there and then faced with these truly massive guns deeply embedded into concrete and therefore pretty impenetrable. After this we opted for a picnic on Omaha beach. We decided against visiting the American cemetery due to the preparations for the Presidents visit on 6^{th} June. This was definitely a good move. When we had decided where and started to set our picnic out, we were approach by a well- spoken US secret service type guy. He let us know that a couple of helicopters would be landing quite nearby and he did not want our picnic ruined. Amazingly he was not asking us to move but was simply concerned for us! We decided to brave it out. As we uncorked the wine and set out the cheese, at the appointed hour we stood by our stations – I held on to the wine..... and made sure that our picnic did not blow away. Can you imagine being 50 yards from the military helicopter - We cannot imagine what the crew thought – probably that we were eccentric or crazy or both. They are no doubt right.

- 2) The meeting will be governed by the General Regulations of the RAC Motor Sports Association Ltd, these supplementary regulations and any written instructions that the organising club may issue for the event.
- 3) The RAC Motor Sports Association will issue an exemption certificate for this event.
- 4) The event is open to all fully elected members of the Inter Register Club.
- 5) All competitors and drivers must produce a valid Club membership card.
- 6) The event is a round of the Inter Register Club Championship.
- 7) The programme of the meeting will be; Signing on from 100.00am. Any competitor not signed on by 11.00 may be excluded. Tests will start at 10.45 and will end no latter than 5.00pm.
- Cars will be required to complete a number of Tests of driving skill and competence. All tests will be carried out entirely on private land on tarmac. The Schedule of Tests will be supplied after signing in.
- 9) The event will consist of two classes; <u>Experts.</u> The driver having won First, Second or Third Class award in VSCC or IRC event, and <u>Novices.</u> Competitors are to declare their status on the Entry form.
- 10) Awards will be presented for First, Second, Third individual places, best team and best placed novice.
- 11) The entry fee for the competition is £10. All entries must be on the official entry form accompanied by the fee. Entries close on 20th July 2009.
