MOT testing

Undoubtedly the hottest topic, on the technical front, arising in the past couple of weeks or so is the news that the Department of Transport intends exempting all pre-1960 vehicles from a compulsory MOT, with effect from November 18th next. This, seemingly, has been met with a mixed response from the motoring press, clubs and by grass-roots historic vehicle owners themselves, although it's probably fair to state that the majority of the latter welcome the announcement since it's been increasingly obvious for some time now that the MOT test, certainly in its present form, is an anachronism and pretty much out of touch so far as the inspection of our ancient specimens of transport is concerned. Obviously, more details have to be forthcoming before a proper assessment can be made on the issue but, whatever the outcome is and whatever the 'small print' might eventually introduce, I for one, will still want to have some form of periodic check carried out by a knowledgeable, historic-car friendly and independent engineer. The additional bonus of having the opportunity also to take a good look under the car, whilst it's up on the lift, will be well worth any (modest?) charge, which might be levied for this service.

QUERIES OF THE MONTH


Some more "Queries of the Month", these originally appeared in "The Austin Magazine & Advocate" during the 1930s and 1940s.

This month's selection consists of No 459, Overheating, Austin Seven and No 755, Petrol System, Austin Twelve-Six.

No 459 appeared in January 1933 and No 755 appeared in August 1936.

No 459 – Overheating, Austin Seven

Q. I seem to find that my 1928 Austin Seven seems to run hot, but there are no signs of boiling. I am wondering if you can give me your advice as to the cause.



A. Overheating such as you are experiencing need not unduly alarm you unless, of course, you find that the engine boils when you get a long hill climb or much low gear work. Theoretically, so long as the water is not boiling, the hotter the engine runs the more efficient it is, providing that the overheating is not due to some defect within the engine itself. Overheating arises from a number of causes. It may be that your ignition is too retarded so that the gases burn slowly and have contact with a bigger area of the cylinders than normally, thus taxing the cooling system.

Again, if the mixture on which you are running is weak, there will be similar results due to slow combustion. There is also the possibility that your fan is slipping, due to the belt-tension needing adjustment, or perhaps the radiator has been become choked with mud. The remedy in each of these instances is quite simple.


Another possibility is a chocked water connection interfering with the circulation. If you find after a run that the temperature of the top of the radiator is markedly different from that at the bottom, you should remove the top hose connection and see whether it has frayed inside to restrict the circulation, in which event a new connection should be fitted.

No 755 – Petrol System, Austin Twelve-Six

Q. In several car parks and in other places recently (on ferries, for instance) I have seen instructions to the effect that the petrol should be turned off. As there does not appear to be any petrol tap on my Twelve-Six car I am wondering how to comply with such a request.

A. On cars equipped with petrol systems relying on gravity feed, whether direct from the main tank, or from an auxiliary tank fed from the main tank by suction, a petrol tap is necessary between the supply and the carburetter to provide a more positive cut-off for the petrol than the needle valve in the float chamber. The notices you have seen refer only to vehicles having this form of system.

On your car a mechanical pump lifts the petrol from a lower level to the carburetter float chamber and a petrol tap is unnecessary as there is no risk of petrol escaping via the carburetter while the engine is not running to give rise to the risk of fire.



You can thus disregard instructions such as you mention, knowing that the petrol system on your car is automatically turned off.


