IN THE WORKSHOP

Not much to report due too much work and not enough play. Myrtle is almost oil tight now. Have established the only oil leak is now from the fuel pump so having refitted the original valve cover with breather holes, am now trying a new gasket with just a slot in it for the lever to pass through to try and minimise oil migrating from crankcase to pump body. There seems to be some end float on Molly's new spring pins and bushes so will sort it by inserting some king pin spacer washers. Strange that I have never seen any shims or spacers on any other cars though but it might improve her steering! Mable's engine with repaired block is now back together and is running nicely on the bench so will be returned to service so Muriel can have her engine back.

Paint Removal Methods

Paint removal is a major job in a ground up restoration. If you don't remove all the old paint there may be paint solvent reactions or hidden defects under the paint. So how do you get the paint off, and what do you do to get rid of the rust you inevitably uncover?

You may start off enthusiastically with a sander but find that the pads keep clogging and the wire brushes won't reach into those dark recesses and corners. Then it's out with the paint stripper, but it's hazardous to use, burns your skin, is difficult to dispose of and wrecks the kitchen floor when you go in the house for coffee. How will you get off the residues left on the bodyshell?

Instead, you could send it to the local shot blaster, or maybe not; many good shells have been wrecked by over-zealous blasters using steel grit on car panels. Soft soda blasting looks like a great system, but the soda is alkaline and as residues warm up on a hot day it becomes much more alkaline soda ash, which seeps out of the crevices and can damage your new paint later.

Chemical dipping gets rid of all the paint and underseal, but it also removes the original lead loading because the bodies are heated up and it melts. All the seam sealer is removed leaving open seams that can harbour the chemical dipping residues,









re-apply seam sealer as well as the manufacturers did it. The heat applied during this process may have the potential to cause body distortion, and applying advanced primer systems onto a chemically clean bodyshell is pointless before areas that require replacing are cut out - these coatings have to be ground away to weld and the very areas that need the most protection will be left unprotected.

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
QUERIES OF THE MONTH

Some more "Queries of the Month", these originally appeared in "The Austin Magazine & Advocate" during the 1930s and 1940s. This month's selection consists of No 550, Universal Joint – Austin Light Twelve-Four and No 991, Transmission Shudder – Austin Seven

No 550 appeared in December 1933, and No 991 appeared in May 1940.

No 550 – Universal Joint – Austin Light Twelve-Four

Q. As the universal joint on my Light Twelve-Four only requires lubrication once every 1,000 miles (according to the handbook), I presume it is important to ensure that sufficient lubricant is then given. How much is actually required at this mileage? I shall be grateful for your guidance on this point.




A. It is difficult to quote any definite quantity of lubricant as being necessary for the universal joint every 1,000 miles of running, but you can be sure that the joint is completely filled with oil or grease when, as the lubricant is being injected by the gun, the old lubricant is seen to exude through the vent hole on the other side of the joint. It is a good plan to continue injecting the new lubricant even when the old is coming out in this way, as it ensures that the joint is charged with plenty of new oil or grease to ensure lubrication efficiency during the next 1,000 miles

No 991 – Transmission Shudder – Austin Seven

Q. I am writing to ask of you to give me your opinion of the following matter. I have an Austin Seven 1937 model Ruby saloon, and have noticed that lately when the car is stationary and I accelerate the engine and then gradually let the clutch in, the car seems to shudder and won't start smoothly. It doesn't matter if I let the clutch in quickly or slowly or accelerate quickly, the dragging seems to be there. Myself, I think that it seems as if the radius rod anchorage wants adjusting, but if you would kindly give me your opinion and instructions I should be very grateful to you.

A. Without having your car for examination it is not easy to say with certainty exactly the cause of the shudder you get when starting. While this may be due to imperfect clutch action, possibly arising from oil on the linings, wear, or some other abnormality, it appears more likely that there has developed some wear or play in the transmission.



There is no question of the radius rod anchorage being at fault as this is purely for the purpose of locating the front axle in relation to the frame and securing its proper alignment, but there is a possibility that the torque tube anchorage requires taking up where it engages with the ball flange on the frame, or the setting for the ball end of the torque tube requires adjusting due to slackness. Even the torque tube bearings or bevel pinion bearings might be responsible, requiring renewal through wear.


Another point you might consider is wear in the rear spring anchorage bushes, as this might tend to give the effect of which you complain. Your best plan is to have all these points, including the clutch, examined by a competent repairer, who can very easily advise you as to the adjustments or replacements necessary.
