QUERIES OF THE MONTH


Some more "Queries of the Month", these originally appeared in "The Austin Magazine & Advocate" during the 1930s and 1940s. This month's selection consists of No 834, Outside Mirror – Austin Twelve and No 841, Spare Wheel – Austin Seven.

No 834 appeared in November 1937 and No 841 in December 1937.

No 834 – Outside Mirror – Austin Twelve

Q. Do you recommend the use of an outside mirror on the Austin Twelve? If so what position?

A. Some drivers like to have an additional mirror outside the car which will give them a view of that potion of the road which, for the inside mirror, is obstructed by the rear quarter panel of the body.




An outside mirror can either be mounted on the wing behind the off-side lamp or on the hinge of the driver's door. When fitted in the latter position the post that supports the mirror sometimes replaces the hinge-pin, making a very convenient mounting. Your local Austin dealer should be able to supply a mirror of either type.

No 841 – Spare Wheel – Austin Seven

Q. I am never satisfied unless all nuts and bolts are really tight, but the spare wheel on my Ruby saloon presents a problem. Unless the locking screw and plate are tight the wheel moves about in its housing, but when screwed well home the plate seriously distorts the two wheel spokes against which it bears.

A. This is an instance of damage due to the spare wheel being wrongly housed after a hurried roadside change. It is essential that the spare wheel be placed in the rear compartment with the brake drum side of the hub exposed; the wheel clamp can then bear evenly on the rim and the brake drum can be screwed up tight.



If the wheel is replaced facing the wrong way, the clamp bears on one or perhaps two of the wire wheel spokes, and damage is easily caused.

THE CHALLENGE OF JAPAN

NE of the surprise news items from last year's Paris Motor Show was the announcement that for the first time a Japanese car, the Skyline Prince, was on show. It is a four-door six-seater car with a 1,484 c.c. four-cylinder engine developing a top speed of 77 m.p.h., a brake horse power of 60 and capable of 38 m.p.g. It is priced at about £700 for a standard model and £930 for a de luxe version. The Japanese Government are reported to be heavily subsidising its manufacture in order to boost sales by undercutting prices. Other Japanese cars are in course of development. For example, the new Japanese midget, the Datsun, manufactured by the Nissau Automobile Company, is in full-scale production. Whether its price-cutting policy will be sufficient to foil import duties in the various countries in which it is proposed to compete remains to be seen, but Germany and Japan are knocking at our door—and the door of our customers.
