## Club Christmas Dinner - 2007

As previously announced the Club Christmas Dinner this year is scheduled for Monday 3<sup>rd</sup> December. The question as to where it should be held has exercised the committee a little since, as many must be aware, there has been a quite noticeable increase in club membership taking place recently and finding a venue able to cope with the anticipated number of members wishing to attend the event has been an important consideration.

In the past couple of years it has been necessary to operate a 'First come, First served' policy because of limited capacity at 'The Falcon', Rotherwick where we have held the dinner. This year we have contacted 'The Falcon' again but have decided against doing so this year for a number of reasons. Firstly the establishment appears to be under new management and initial impressions, unfortunately, have not been especially favourable. More significantly, though, the cost of just a two-course menu has been set at a fairly hefty £21.95, whilst a three course menu has increased to £25.95! Perhaps, most importantly though, the necessity, due to limited capacity of 'The Falcon', to restrict numbers is felt to be a little unfair and a venue able to avoid this has been a key factor in the search for somewhere suitable.

At the same time we have also been in touch with 'The Longbridge Mill' at Sherfield on Loddon. Many members may recall we held our Christmas Dinner there a few years ago and the experience was not a great one! The location and ambience was fine but the food was less so. Why, you may well ask, would we consider returning there this year?

Well - the place is under completely new management; it is now a *Brewers Fayre* restaurant which, generally, are sources of good food and service. Nevertheless, it has been made crystal clear to the management that, should we choose to patronize the establishment again, our previous experience is one we certainly would not wish to be repeated and we do have an assurance on this point. We will be seated in a large area upstairs, adjacent to ancient milling machinery, which has now been restored to a fully functioning condition. Although milling will not actually be taking place during our meal, the machinery will be fully visible and access to it may be possible which makes for added interest to an already attractive environment fully capable of accommodating as many club members and their partners as may wish to attend.

The four-course meal is priced at £14.99 which, being so reasonable, will not (as has been the case in previous years) be subsidized out of club funds. Elsewhere in this Newsletter is the Menu for your perusal, together with a Reservation and Menu Choices form.

If you wish to participate in this years Christmas Dinner, please complete the form and return it to me by 16<sup>th</sup> October at the latest, together with a deposit of £5.00 per person or, if you prefer, for the full amount of £14.99 per person. Please note that this dead-line has to be firm and a

decision, therefore, is required promptly from those wishing to attend the Festive Dinner at The Longbridge Mill on December 3<sup>rd</sup>.

(What an appropriate name, incidentally, for a venue for *our* particular club's function!)

## Fxcursion 2008

Those of you who attended the last Club Night on September 10<sup>th</sup> (John & Joan's Quiz Night) will be aware that a 'straw poll' taken then gave a fairly clear indication that, so far as next year's excursion is concerned, no strong preference existed for either Norton Grange or Bembridge (both Isle of Wight Warner establishments) although most favoured a departure from our usual May timing and chose September as an alternative month for the trip. It was quite apparent that, although there was keen interest in a trip somewhere, most didn't seem to mind about the actual destination.

Accordingly, a booking has been made *provisionally* for a nominal group of 30 at Norton Grange, near Yarmouth, Isle of Wight, for the long week-end September 5 –8 2008. However, this number is a pure guess in the dark simply to secure accommodation before it might suddenly become unavailable. Therefore, if you would like to join the jaunt 'across the water' next year I would ask you to please get back to me soonest but, again, and in any event, *by October 16th* confirming your intention of doing so.

The discounted cost of the three-nights, four days trip, half-board is confirmed at £129.00 per person. Ferry fares next year have increased over last year's costs; they now are £35.00 per car with one, two or three occupants and free for vehicles with four occupants.

The price quoted is for normal chalet accommodation although a limited number of Premier Chalets, having a little more space and 'superior' décor, are available at an extra £15.00 per room per night. If you would prefer such accommodation please mention this.

Please don't delay contacting me using the form included with this Newsletter.

Please complete as indicated with your preferences, and return it to me together with a deposit of £30.00 per person by October 16th

Once again, can I ask you please to act promptly on both the above issues. There can, unfortunately, be <u>no</u> exceptions, once the mentioned dead-line date has passed!

See you at the next Club Night, which should prove very interesting hearing, first-hand, from Julie (Els), what life's really like living under Robert Mugabe's infamous regime. Meanwhile, Take care and safe travels!
