Colin's Column

Once again, last month, I was interested in the old adverts that Andy keeps coming up with, where do you get them from Andy?

The one that particularly caught my eye was the one for the Reliant car, having once owned one of these, amazingly cheap to run, three wheelers. It was about 1976, soon after moving to Wokingham, when we only had one car, we could not afford to run two in those days (ah bring out the violins). I needed the car to get to work, which meant Ann had no transport. However, our neighbour, who had been in the army, had a Reliant Regal van which he had used to get to Arborfield each day but was now selling as he had left and got a job in "civvie street". It was about ten years old and in remarkably good condition, I therefore decided to buy it and used it to get to work leaving Ann with the car.

Considering the wheel arrangement, it was amazingly stable and gave very reliable and economical service for a few years. It reminded me very much of driving the Austin 7 which I had in the early sixties. Not surprising perhaps as the engine was a development of the Austin Seven.

An engineer named Tom Williams, in about 1935, built the first Reliant in Tamworth. It was a van and he built it in his back garden. However he had to take it to pieces again to get it through the house. He had formally worked for Raleigh and left to build his own 3 wheeler. The reason he chose the name Reliant is believed to be because he used many Raleigh parts which had the initial R on them so he wanted a name beginning with R. The first vans used JAP 600cc single cylinder air-cooled engines and soon changed to 747cc v-twin water cooled ones but in 1937 Reliant acquired the use of Austin 7 engines which arrived complete from Longbridge. They continued to use these until 1939 when, with the production of the Austin 7 ceasing, they started building their own side valve engine very closely based on the Austin 7 specials built in the 1950 and 1960s.

Reliant continued producing vehicles after the war but the first car did not come until 1952 when Tom Williams modified the van body to take four seats. The Reliant became quite popular during the fifties with petrol rationing and very cheap road tax, being taxed as a motorcycle. The most famous Reliant of course was the one used by 'Trotters Independent Trading'.

They did produce some four-wheel cars including the Scimitar sport car, one of which was owned by Princess Ann in her younger days. In 1999 the factory at Tamworth was demolished and production was moved to Cannock but due to various problems production ceased in 2002. This year Reliant celebrates its 75th birthday although today only selling spare parts.

The site of the old factory at Tamworth is now a housing estate called "Scimitar Park" with the main road being called "Tom Williams Way" the other roads being named after Reliant vehicles. These include Robin Close, Fox Close and Regal Close.

Vintage Coach Trip to the Isle of Wight.

On Saturday 4th September, 27 of us arrived at Mervin's Coaches in Micheldever for a coach trip to the Isle of Wight in a 1949 Bedford OB Coach, which had been arranged for us by Trevor Mulford. The coach was in amazing condition considering it was 61 years old and having been in constant use from new, including being used in many films and TV programmes. Mervin acquired it in 1978.



We set off at 9.30pm to catch the 11.00am ferry from Southampton arriving in Cowes an hour later. We then made our way to the Folly Inn at Whippingham which legend has it, originated from a French smuggling barge that ran aground in the 1700s selling illegal alcohol. This became a success leading to the inn it is today. It has a rustic appearance with walls, ceiling and floors all original. We enjoyed an excellent lunch, which was served with amazing speed.

We then moved off for a trip around the island, stopping for an ice cream while the engine cooled down after a lot of hill climbing, before arriving at Godstone for tea and a little light retail therapy for the ladies. It was then off to catch the 6.30am ferry to the main land and back to Micheldever.

We had a very enjoyable day helped by good weather and excellent company. Many thanks to Trevor M. for coming up with this idea and arranging the day.

Joining us on the coach were Brian and Marlene Grant who had travelled up from Cornwall and were staying with us for two weeks. This meant apart from the coach trip, Marlene was able to also join us at Bramshill whilst Brian was at Beaulieu and they were both able to come to the September club night. I am sure they enjoyed meeting up with old friends, as I am sure the old friends were happy to catch up with them. Ann and I certainly enjoyed their company and we had some good laughs whilst they stayed with us.

The Estate was acquired by the Home Office in 1953 and since then has been a working police college and place of business for the National Policing Improvement Agency NPIA. A fair number of members visited during the day to enjoy the wonderful house and grounds, most coming in their 'proper' cars, which caused quite a bit of interest in the car parks. Ann and I went along in Arabella taking Marlene and Maureen with us, as Brian and Don were busy at Beaulieu. A very enjoyable day in good company, very many thanks to Malcolm and Sandra for their generous hospitality and also to Phil and Jan for advising us about the open day.

<u>'Níghtjar 2010'</u>

That time of the year is again fast approaching and plans are well-advanced for this year's event, to be held on Saturday 20th November.

Since we've managed to attract a number of new members to the Club in the past twelve months or so and, at the real risk (for which I apologise) of boring those who are already familiar with the '*Nightjar*', this is the Club's premier event and is open to members of invited clubs as well as to our own members.

Officially, it's described as a Navigational Scatter Rally and, as the name might suggest, is held during hours of darkness. In reality, it's a kind of orienteering treasure hunt where the object of the exercise is to visit specific locations, identified on a map by grid references, and, once there, to perform some task in order to discover the precise location of a hidden sign bearing the name of a bird – again as suggested by the name. Those competitors/crews amassing most points then qualify for various trophies/awards presented during the late supper consumed after the last team has returned at approximately 10:3pm.

The '*Nightjar*', being also the final annual event within the Inter-Register calendar of activities, attracts a number of entries from quite a large area of the country – for example, Kent, Gloucester, Warwickshire and elsewhere.

As may be supposed, an event such as this requires a considerable amount of planning and certainly would not be possible to stage without the help and support of a number of essential personnel. In particular, marshals (two per each of six Manned Control Points – i.e. 12 in all) are needed to distribute and mark the Clue Sheets/Route Cards of competitors. In previous years we've managed this need quite well but, this year, find ourselves short of a few.

Of course, we would like as many members from within our Club as possible to actually *enter* the event but, if there is anyone who may not wish to enter, but is still willing to help by marshalling, we would very much like to hear from them.

If further information or clarification is needed before making a decision we would be please to provide this to satisfy curiosity or allay any fears!

Please think about this and if the prospect of sitting in a car, out in the Hampshire countryside, for a few hours in late November, followed by a hot supper (free!) on return to the Elizabeth Hall, Hook, as an alternative to watching some banal, mind-numbing 'reality' show on TV, has greater appeal then please get back to me, or any Committee Member *soonest*.

We really do need you!
